January 12, 2025 Baptism of the Lord— C

A Message from Fr. Tom Donovan:



In the three-year readings cycle for the Church, 2025 is considered "Year C", which is the year of the Gospel of Luke. Much we know about Luke is because of his relationship with Paul. Paul identified Luke as a physician. We also know that Luke was probably of Jewish descent, completely familiar with the Greek culture. Indeed, Luke's writing style (in Greek) was highly polished and sophisticated.

In two weeks, on the Third Sunday of Ordinary Time, we will hear the gospel that speaks of Jesus entering the synagogue and pulling down the scroll of Isaiah, rolling through all of the possible

references of who the Messiah would be, he chose the reading that says:

The spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he has anointed me to bring glad tidings to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim liberty to captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free and to proclaim a year acceptable to the Lord.

A central theme of the Gospel of Luke is that of the Jubilee. In the Jewish culture, after every (7 x 7 =) 49 years, there would be a 50th 'Jubilee Year', all debts would be forgiven, slaves would be freed, and family lands pledged to others would be returned. This kind of system would be unheard of in our own society which depends on the integrity and coercion of long-term debts. The economy of the Jewish people adapted remarkably well to this system. Unlike our own economy, the Jewish people did not experience debt-based bubbles of over-consumption or the severity of cultural injustices which resulted in classes of people becoming permanent "haves" and others becoming "have-nots". Consider how, probably once in a person's life time, if they or their fathers had been dispossessed of their family lands to pay debts or for any other reason, that they would receive them back... free... once... so that a person could have a 'second chance' to restore the wealth of their family and participate in the wealth of society! For the poor and debtors and their children, the Jubilee might be the only chance they had at being successful. Of course, the rich and those with ill-gotten gains would have no interest in perpetuating the Jubilee Year tradition.

Indeed, by the time of the late prophets, Israel had started getting away from the Jubilee, observing the restoration of justice in the breach, rather than in its full spirit. Consider what this means when Jesus proclaims a Jubilee Year. Those taken into slavery... released. Those dispossessed of the lands... restored. Those oppressed... forgiven. Might this give a new energy to the Lord's Prayer, as recorded by Luke, where we pray, "forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors"? Looking all the way back in biblical history, are we not all the children of Adam and Eve, who have been dispossessed of our lands, sold into slavery, and who owe an impossible debt to God through our sins?

When the Lord proclaims a Year of Jubilee, our fortunes are being fully restored! A Jubilee Year would be proclaimed in the synagogues on Yom Kippur, the day of atonement. On that day, the people would recall their covenant with God, trusting in his mercy and justice, and re-committing themselves to live in justice with one another. Only those who practice justice would themselves be worthy of being treated with justice... isn't this a form of "forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us"? This is where the baptism of John comes in. John gives a baptism of repentance. Jesus takes baptism a step further. He offers John's baptism of repentance with the power of the Spirit—the same Spirit that accepts the repentance of a dispossessed people, and in turn, proclaims a year of Jubilee to restore justice between all of God's people. Going forward during the year, watch how Luke presumes that those who have received Divine Mercy now have the obligation to practice that mercy with others.

In 2025, the universal Church celebrates a Jubilee devoted to hope: "hope does not disappoint" (Rom 5:5). With the opening of the Jubilee doors in Rome, the faithful are called to turn once again to Christ who is the 'door' to salvation, that we proclaim him always and everywhere as 'our hope'. Renewed in a new-found spirit of justice inspired by this Jubilee, and in response to his universal call to holiness, we are called to be transformed by our meditation on the virtue of Hope as we cross the threshold of 2025.








A Message from Mrs. Carol Frericks—Principal
